

## Luncheon honors air station and Cutter Sycamore crews with raffle prizes, certificates and newly-adapted Sugpiaq word for Coast Guard: 'Imam Teggiistai'

**R**ed, white and blue decorations on each table at the Little Chapel welcomed service members, families and the community on Sept. 14 to the Native Village of Eyak's fourth annual U.S. Coast Guard Appreciation Luncheon.

The patriotic color theme extended to Diane Ujioka's cakes, glistening in sunlight seeping through the windows, with blue and red berries accenting fluffy white frosting.

Crews from the U.S. Coast Guard Air Station Cordova and the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Sycamore were honored at the event, which had guardsmen cheering and clapping as names were drawn periodically in a raffle for prizes donated by the community and businesses.

Guard members were also given certificates of appreciation from Cordova District Fishermen United, in thanks from the fleet, especially for their aid in search and rescue and navigation.

For the Sycamore Chief Electricians Mate and Tribal Member Donald Ladd, returning home to Cordova offers a way to help the community he was raised in.

Ladd has been a member of the Coast Guard for nearly 14 years, starting his career in Seattle and returning to serve in Cordova in 2011. After his billet was up, he left in 2014 to serve in Alameda, CA and San Juan, Puerto Rico. He returned this summer to serve another three-year billet in Cordova.

Belen Cook, coordinator for NVE's Sobriety Celebration and wellbeing, served as emcee for the luncheon.

"That's awesome and you're home-grown too!" she said laughing as Ladd approached the front with a winning raffle ticket, to collect gifts including a gift certificate from local food truck, Homegrown.

"...To see that appreciation; the love that the town does have for ... Coast

Guard and the support that's here, that's really neat to see," Ladd said.

Sarah Kathrein, Tribal Judicial Systems Administrator for NVE, was the luncheon's event organizer for the third consecutive year.

"If I had to host an event for NVE, this is the event I'd want to host," she said. "We always try to have it as close to Aug. 4 as possible because that's the Coast Guard's birthday."

Event planning began in July, which kept her busy seeking donations and collaborating on food and decorations, and more.

"I think it's actually just nice to give the Coast Guard the nod that they deserve in this community," Kathrein said. "They have an impact on every

aspect of the community and I think that we sometimes forget that. Cordova wouldn't be the same without them here."

Tribal Council Chairman Darrel Olsen presented Lt. Cmdr Collin Bronson, commander of the Sycamore, with a Native Village of Eyak flag, the first of its kind.

Shyla Krukoff gave a brief language lesson for the group of roughly 115, explaining how to say Coast Guard in Sugpiaq.

"Imam Teggiistai," she said slowly, repeating the pronunciation a few times. People in the audience listened intently and repeated the words back to her.

The word, pronounced, Ee-mum teg-geest-ai, was created just six weeks prior by a group of elders.

Imam means "ocean" while Teggiistai could possibly mean "watch over," Krukoff said. ■

Every year since 2003, the Native Village of Eyak has collected data to estimate the annual inriver abundance of adult Copper River King salmon. Post season, the inriver abundance estimate is combined with harvest data to determine system-wide escapement and total run size. This project is an integral part of Copper River salmon management and is used by state and federal fishery managers for assessing the size and health of the population.

Beginning in early May, NVE biologists and fisheries technicians are deployed at two remote research sites on the Copper River. The first research site, Baird Camp, is located near Baird Canyon approximately 30 miles upriver of the Copper River Highway washout at 36-mile. The second research site, Canyon Creek Camp, is another 56 miles upriver of Baird Canyon, located just below Wood Canyon near the Village of Chitina.

Two fishwheels operate at each research site for capturing migrating adult King salmon. Captured fish are deposited into one of two 1100-gallon circulating livetanks. Escape panels (designed by Tribal Member Bill Webber) are located at the end of each live-tank allowing small fish to escape (e.g. small red salmon) while retaining King salmon.

NVE's fishwheel #1 and fishwheel #2 operate on opposite river banks in Baird Canyon. The Canyon Creek Camp operates fishwheel #3 and fishwheel #4. Fishwheels #1, 2, and 3 are designed specifically for research and constructed of aluminum with three baskets each. The research style fishwheels

are effective at fishing rock ledges, boulder banks, back eddy edges, and cliffs, where water depth quickly increases. Fishwheel #4 is a subsistence style fishwheel constructed of timber and spruce poles similar to traditional fishwheels used upriver but with four-baskets instead of two. The subsistence style

wheel is effective at fishing gravel bars and cutbanks and has the ability to dig into the gravel. Fishwheel #4 was originally designed and built in 2002 by Ahnta Tribal Member Johnny Goodlataw and Bruce Cain. In 2018, a new set of baskets for fishwheel #4 was built by Bruce Cain and Ahnta Tribal Members, with NVE project funds and a generous donation of time by Ahnta. The new baskets were transported from O'Brien Creek near Chitina to Canyon Creek Camp via river skiff on May 23, 2018 and operated flawlessly through the entire 2018 field season.

All four fishwheels operate continuously from river break up through the end of the King salmon run in July. The crews spend substantial amounts of time maintaining and adjusting the fishwheel as debris levels and discharge continually change in the highly dynamic Copper River.

All King salmon captured in Baird Canyon are tagged, measured, and released to continue their upriver migration. When these fish reach the upriver Canyon Creek fishwheels, a portion of the tagged King salmon and untagged King salmon are captured, examined for a tag, measured, marked, and again released. The ratio of tagged to untagged King salmon at the upriver research site provides a ratio which allows for an estimate of inriver King salmon abundance

through Baird Canyon. The 2018 data is currently being reviewed by NVE biologists and an announcement of the 2018 Copper River King salmon abundance is anticipated in early October.

The Copper River Chinook (King) salmon monitoring program is an integral part of Copper River salmon management and is a prime example of tribal based fisheries research helping ensure a healthy King salmon run exists for future generations of Eyak tribal members. Hiring for the 2019 field season will begin with a job announcement

in December 2018. Please stop by the DENR office at NVE if you or someone you know has interest in working at the NVE camps for the summer of 2019; we would be happy to discuss details of the position and what the work entails. An elders/youth trip to Baird Camp is also planned for the 2019 season if you would like to visit the camps and see the fishwheels in action. ## Ilanka Community Health Clinic *News*

### Flu News

Flu season is coming up. We are waiting on the arrival of this year's vaccines with an anticipated date of early October. Be on the lookout for an automatic call to let you know when they have arrived.

### Public Health Nurse Visits

The State of Alaska Public Health Nurse visits Cordova one week out of the month and works with our own Care Coordinator, Victoria Peterson, on one of those days to host Narcan Kit and Medication Disposal bags distribution. Exact dates for next visit to be announced.

### Medicare Help

We are also heading into Open Enrollment for Medicare Part D, which begins October 15th and ends December 7th. Patients can make changes to their coverage which includes upgrading from original Medicare to Medicare Advantage.

Medicare eligibility starts at age 65. Affordable Care Act enrollment begins in November. If you have questions, contact the clinic at 907-424-3622 and ask for Altana or Tiffany. Also, as a reminder, if you are travelling and experience a medical emergency, Purchased/Referred Care (ANMC) requires notification within 72 hours. Please call 1-800-478-6661 for more details.

### After hours nurse line

Along the lines of health care, Ilanka Clinic is also providing skilled nursing services for after hours. Call us at 907-424-3622 and follow the prompts to reach a licensed nurse. They will assist you in answering questions or determining if you need more advanced care.

### New items at the clinic

Ilanka now has the ability to test for lead in the blood. Residents of fishing communities are recommended to receive this test should they have exposure to lead through fishing, live in an older house that might have lead paint, etc. Testing for the presence of lead is especially important for young children. If your child hasn't had a Well Child Exam recently, or lead testing, we encourage you to schedule a visit.

**RECIPE**

# Kale Citrus Salad

Ree Drummond

**Ingredients**

- 1 bunch Kale
- 2-3 tablespoons lemon juice
- ¼ cup red or yellow onions, chopped
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 orange, cubed
- ½ to 1 full avocado, mashed w/ lemon juice
- 5-8 dates, dried and chopped
- Pepper to taste
- ¼ cup toasted almonds

**To prepare:**

Toast almonds at 350°F until lightly toasted, about 5-10 minutes. Mash avocado, lemon juice, and olive oil together. De-vein kale and chop into bite-sized pieces. Combine kale and remaining ingredients. Toss kale mixture with avocado mixture and toss until well coated. Add almonds before serving. Enjoy!

## Help with Medicare Costs

### Extra Help with Prescriptions (Part D)

Anyone on Medicare can enroll in a Part D Prescription Plan. Extra Help is a program that helps with your prescription drug plan costs. If you qualify, you can enroll in a Medicare Part D prescription plan anytime, or change your current plan.

*If you are on Medicaid, SSI, or get help from the Medicare Savings Program, you automatically qualify for extra help so no need apply.*

**Alaska 2018 Income Limits for Extra Help:**

**\$1,918/month (single)    \$2,593/month (couples)**

**Alaska 2018 Assets\* Limits for Extra Help**

**\$14,100 (single)    \$28,150 (couples)**

### The Medicare Savings Program

Another program that helps with Medicare costs is the Medicare Savings Program. You must be eligible for Medicare Part A (Hospital) to apply. This pays your Medicare Part B (Medical) premiums.

Income and Assets Limits can change each year.\*
